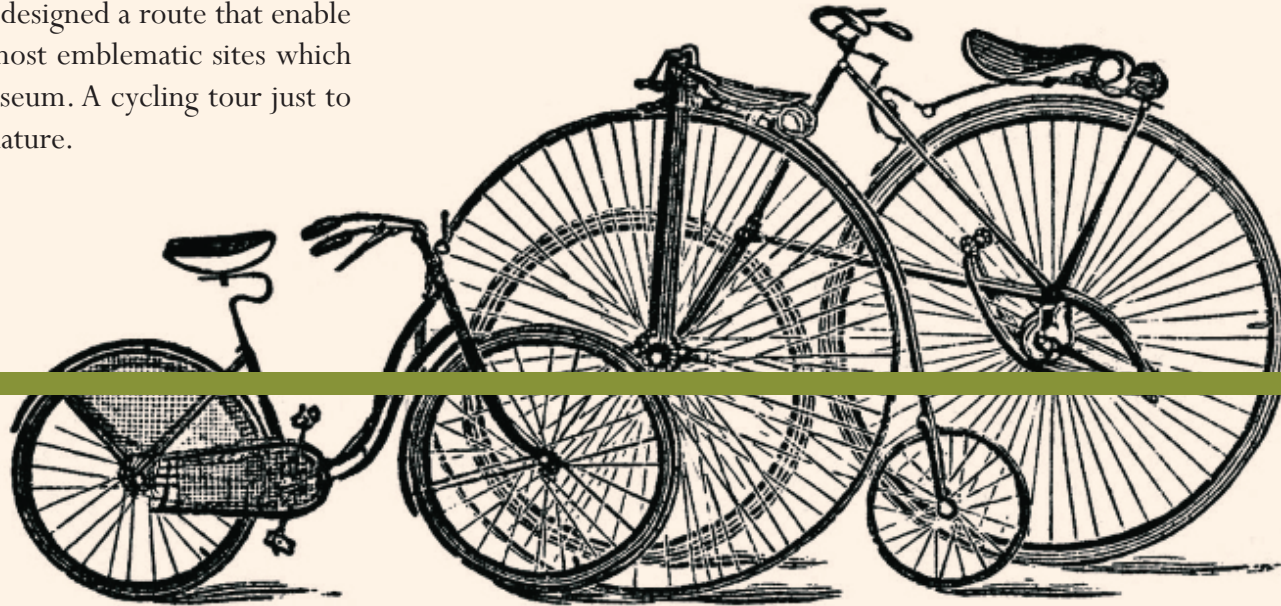


ALL ROADS LEAD TO CERRALBO

For all those who love to discover different places by riding your bike, we have designed a route that enable us to enjoy some of the most emblematic sites which are near the Cerralbo Museum. A cycling tour just to enjoy the best of art and nature.



The tour begins at Madrid's most imposing palace, the **Palacio Real (1)**, whose construction started in the year 1738 under the reign of King Philip. At the right of El Palacio Real we can find the **Plaza de Oriente (2)**, which is a great opportunity to get lost among the paths and discover the statutes of the Spanish monarchs. At the end of the Plaza de Oriente, you will come across San Quintín Street. Around this block, you will find treasures like **the Convento de la Encarnación (3)**, the **Plaza de la Marina (4)** and the **Palacio del Marqués de Grimaldi (5)**. Then, by going down Bailén Street, one will reach the Plaza de España, where you will be able to discover the **Compañía Asturiana de Minas building (6)**: which was built in the late 19th century and is characterized by its beautiful towers topped with domes. The Plaza de España, at the corner of Ferraz Street, you will see another architectural gem, **La Casa**

Gallardo (7), which is an iconic example of Art Nouveau architecture in Madrid. The **Cerralbo Museum (8)** completes the triad of the fin de siècle architectural Madrid. Take a break from the cycling and visit what was once the home of one of the most important art collectors of his time, and which is unique in that it still retains the original décor. Then, the journey continues through the **Templo de Debod (9)**, a little piece of Egypt in Madrid, and the **Paseo del Pintor Rosales (10)**, the home that keeps a statue of the minister of Argüelles; whom this illustrious district is named, as well as a sculpture of Infanta Isabel of Bourbon, popularly known as "La Chata". Cycling down **Parque del Oeste (11)** you will have the chance to explore areas as the Terminal del Fulicular, the Rosaleda or the Nature. And if you still have the energy to pedal, cycle up Cuesta de San Vicente to reach **Príncipe Pío and Madrid Río (12)**.
